

Mission: Books from Brek collects, processes, and distributes quality new and gently used children's books to significantly increase book ownership among at-risk infants, toddlers and school-age children throughout the Champaign/Urbana area.

Vision: Increasing book ownership among at-risk infants, toddlers and school-age children will:

- Improve the reading achievement of children by increasing their access to print
- Recognize having books in the home is twice as important as the father's education level
- Close the gap in the ratio of books per child among middle- and low- income families.
- Increase the knowledge of families in the relationship between reading success in school and being read to prior to school among all children.
- Change the fact that millions of children show up to the first day of kindergarten never having seen a book before in their lives.

Brek loved turning the pages of his books and having someone read to him. We hope that this foundation can further the love of reading in many young children. Brek's family manage the funding, selecting, and distributing of all books. Our family members take responsibility to order, level, bag, and distribute books.

Our Impact

We have distributed approximately 31,500 books from 2016 to 2022. We have distributed 3,000 books so far in 2022 and hope to distribute 3,000 more to reach our

goal of 34,500 by December 31.




The benefits of reading aloud to children birth to kindergarten

Whether you're reading a classic novel or fairy tales before bed, reading aloud to children can significantly benefit your child's life. Some benefits reading to children include:

Whether you're reading a classic novel or fairy tales before bed, reading aloud to children can significantly benefit your child's life. Some benefits reading to children include:

- Supported cognitive development: Cognitive development is the emergence of the ability to think and understand. When you read aloud, it essentially provides them with background knowledge, which helps them make sense of what they see, hear, and read.
- Improved language skills: Reading daily starting in infancy, can help with language acquisition, communication skills, social skills, and literacy skills.
- Preparation for academic success: Reading aloud helps children grow their vocabulary skills with
 exposure to new words and listening skills they develop. Both contribute to school readiness and
 academic success.
- Developing a special bond with your child: Reading to your child provides a great opportunity to set up a
 regular, shared event where you can look forward to spending time together. It gives children a sense of
 intimacy and well-being.
- *Increased concentration and discipline:* When you introduce regular reading to a child, you observe a change in behavior. Attention span and memory attention improves.
- Improved imagination and creativity: Reading aloud helps them use their imagination to explore people,
 places, times, and events beyond their own experiences. By widening a child's imagination, the child
 dreams bigger and acts creatively.
- Cultivating lifelong love of reading: Reading is the key for lifelong learning. Reading presents books as
 sources of pleasant, valuable, and exciting experiences. Children who value books are motivated to read
 on their own and will likely continue to practice independent reading throughout the rest of their lives.

We are grateful to the Champaign Library for providing us space to We contribute many books distributed through the Mother Goose program. What's so great about Mother Goose on the Loose?

- A love of learning through nursery rhyme activities and music that will ensures their success throughout their school experiences
- Social and emotional skills such as taking turns, following directions, showing appreciation to others, developing confidence in themselves, and playing with other children
- **Fine and gross motor skills** through fingerplays, dances, and physical exercise
- Literacy-based measurements including holding a book correctly, turning pages appropriately, and understanding test flows from left to right

- Language skills by learning new words, singing songs, hearing sound patterns in words and understanding concepts such as "high" and "low" and phoneme awareness
- **General knowledge about the world** by identifying shapes, colors, and animals, etc.

What are some things I can do to prepare my child for kindergarten?

- Read daily with your child and discuss what you read. Connect it to her daily experience. If reading a book about animals, relate it to your last visit to the zoo.
- Have an active social life. Give your child lots of opportunities to play with others and practice sharing and social skills.
- Encourage your child's independence by giving them chores around the house; have her select her clothes, dress herself, help her make her own snack.
- Help your child 'write' letters to friends and family members. You can begin by tracing letters on paper or in the sand box. Graduate to pencil and paper writing and have it available to work with.
- Play sound games including rhyming words, making up silly songs, repeating tongue twisters.
- Talk to your child about kindergarten and what her day will be like, visit the school if possible and try to set up a play date with future classmates. Encourage your child to talk to you about kindergarten as well.



Less than one-third of Illinois kindergartners begin school "ready"...

Many families lack access to high-quality early childhood opportunities, particularly those from low-income communities, families of color, and those in childcare deserts, which can limit their ability to fully benefit from the positive early learning experiences that help children enter school ready to succeed. Ensuring students are academically and developmentally on track, closing opportunity gaps that begin well before kindergarten, and guaranteeing families have safe environments to place their children are key components to high-quality ECEC.

We believe every child deserves access to equitable opportunities in life, beginning with experiences in the early years. To make that a reality, we need a strong ECEC system from the state to local level, combined with adequate and equitable funding.

Check the data in your community for Kindergartner Readiness. It will be surprising to you!

Thanks to the Illinois Legislature for in 2022 providing additional fundings for early children education. More dollars are available for preschool programs.
